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Anticipation Guide - STRATEGIES

An anticipation guide is a comprehension strategy that is used before reading to activate students' prior knowledge and build curiosity about a new topic. Before reading, students listen to or read several statements about key concepts presented in the text; they're often structured as a series of statements with which the students can choose to agree or disagree.

Antigone Activity #1 : Anticipation Guide Use Before Reading

The first step is to create an anticipation guide. Write statements that focus on the information in the text that you want students to think about. Write statements that students can react to without having read the text Write statements for which information can be identified in the text that supports and/or opposes each statement

" Prior to reading, students read a list of statements about a given topic and begin to make connections with a text they will soon read. Anticipation guides are typically set up as a list of statements where students decide whether to agree or disagree with what is being stated.

Read Write Think Anticipation Guide

After students are familiar with anticipation guides, "let them in" on the thinking you use to choose the statements in the left-hand column. Using text that is at or close to their independent reading level, ask students to make an anticipation guide that they could share with their peers.

Interactive Think Aloud - Comprehension Strategies

Anticipation guides help students build background when they think about ideas before they engage in a text. The guide also helps students to identify and connect themes as they read the text. Anticipation guides can be used to review and reflect on material at the conclusion of a text to see if the reading reinforced or changed students' thinking.

Anticipation Guide + Character POV To help students understand point of view (POV), you can use an anticipation guide where students write down how they feel about the statements. Then, after they read the story, they write down how a specific character feels about the same statements.

A suggestion made for teachers to help their English Language learners is to write the anticipation guide in the student's primary language. "The point is to help students connect to what they will be reading in the target language so that they can better comprehend it, so the anticipation guide can be in any language that is well-comprehended by the student"(Every Language Learner, 2015).
